SUMMARY OF THE WORK OF THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE 2005-2006

PREFACE BY THE CHAIR OF THE LEGISLATION COMMITTEE

The role of the Legislation Committee is to check that the legislation to be made by the Assembly is not defective and that any relevant requirements have been complied with. All subordinate legislation made by the Assembly alone comes before the Legislation Committee: to date, the Committee has considered 1342 Statutory Instruments, 219 pieces of legislation during the period covered by this report (2005-2006).

This very necessary and meticulous scrutiny would be impossible without the contribution of the Committee Members: Eleanor Burnham AM, Rosemary Butler AM, Jeff Cuthbert AM, Janice Gregory AM, Christine Gwyther AM, Ann Jones AM, Brynle Williams AM, Dai Lloyd AM and Janet Ryder AM, as well as Laura Jones AM, who left the Committee in January this year. I particularly would like to thank my predecessor, Glyn Davies AM, who chaired the Committee until January 2006. I would also like to mention the efforts of the Committee's Legal Advisers and officials – their input allows the Committee to work smoothly and efficiently within a tight schedule of weekly meetings.

Finally, I would like to mention that, as the process of the scrutiny of legislation following the 2007 elections to the National Assembly will change, the Legislation Committee has successfully conducted a brief review of arrangements for the technical scrutiny of legislation after the Government of Wales Act 2006 comes into force. I want to thank the Assembly Members, Members and staff of the Scottish Subordinate Legislation Committee, internal and external presenters, Legislation Committee officials and other National Assembly staff for their contributions and help.

PROCEDURES BY WHICH LEGISLATION IS MADE

The National Assembly processes legislation in four different ways: by Standard Procedure, Executive Procedure, Accelerated Procedure or Extended Procedure. The Legislation Committee also scrutinises Standing Order (SO)25.2 and SO29 legislation.

Standard Procedure

Under the Standard Procedure, the responsible Minister publishes a draft order to all members and invites comments on whether it should be considered by a subject committee. Normally the Minister also carries out a regulatory appraisal of the likely costs and benefits of the draft order. The Minister then submits the draft order to the Business Committee and recommends whether it should be referred to a subject committee. Following Business Committee consideration, the Deputy Presiding Officer decides whether the draft order should be referred to a subject committee (extended procedure) and, after any report by the subject committee, the Minister tables the draft order in Plenary and refers it to the Legislation Committee. The Legislation Committee then reports on whether the Assembly should pay special attention to the draft order. After being approved by the Assembly, the order may be made (SO 24).

Extended Procedure

The extended procedure is when a draft order is sent to a subject committee by the Deputy Presiding Officer as outlined within the description of the Standard Procedure above (SO 24.6 – 24.8).

Accelerated Procedure

The Accelerated Procedure is when, on motion of the Minister, the Assembly votes to approve a draft Order without any debate (SO 24.25), but after it has completed all other stages of the Standard Procedure.

Executive Procedure

Under the Executive Procedure, the Assembly Cabinet may determine that it is not reasonably practical to comply with one or more of the standard procedure stages, including seeking approval from the Assembly. Where an Order has been made without consideration by the Assembly a Member may within 40 working days of the Order being made table a motion that the Order be revoked. If it has not been considered by the Legislation Committee before being made, it is referred to the Committee subsequently. Any defects noted under Standing Order 11.7 should normally be rectified the next time the National Assembly legislates on the subject. However, if the defect is particularly serious, amending legislation should be made to rectify the matter as soon as possible.

Standing Order 29 Legislation

The Legislation Committee also considers SO29 legislation. This subordinate legislation is not required to be made by Statutory Instrument and is not subject to parliamentary procedure.

Standing Order 25.2 Legislation

Subordinate legislation subject to a relevant Parliamentary procedure.

SECOND ASSEMBLY: THIRD YEAR ANALYSIS

INTRODUCTION

The role of the Legislation Committee is to scrutinise relevant Assembly subordinate legislation to ensure that it is within the scope of enabling powers and is properly drafted. Its statutory basis is set out in sections 58 and 59 of the Government of Wales Act 1998 and its functions are detailed in Standing Order 11.

This is the Third Annual Report of the work of the Legislation Committee (Second Assembly) covering the period July 2005 - July 2006. During that time the Committee considered a total of **219** pieces of subordinate legislation.

This annual report provides an overview of the Committee's scrutiny of Statutory Instruments. The results are presented in the form of a summary table for ease of reference.

The report also covers the wider aspects of the Committee's work including the Review of the technical scrutiny of legislation post-2007 conducted by the Committee and its continuous concern about the use of monolingual legislation.

COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES: STANDING ORDER 11.7

Standing Order 11.7 sets out grounds on which the Committee is to invite the National Assembly to pay special attention to legislation. The grounds are as follows:

- doubt as to whether the legislation is within the Assembly's powers;
- the legislation appears to make unusual or unexpected use of the powers under which it is made;
- it is excluded from challenge in the courts;
- it appears to have unauthorised retrospective effect;
- its form or meaning needs further explanation;
- its drafting appears to be defective;

and from July 2005

- it fails to fulfil statutory or other legal requirements;
- there appear to be inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts
- the subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- the subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh.

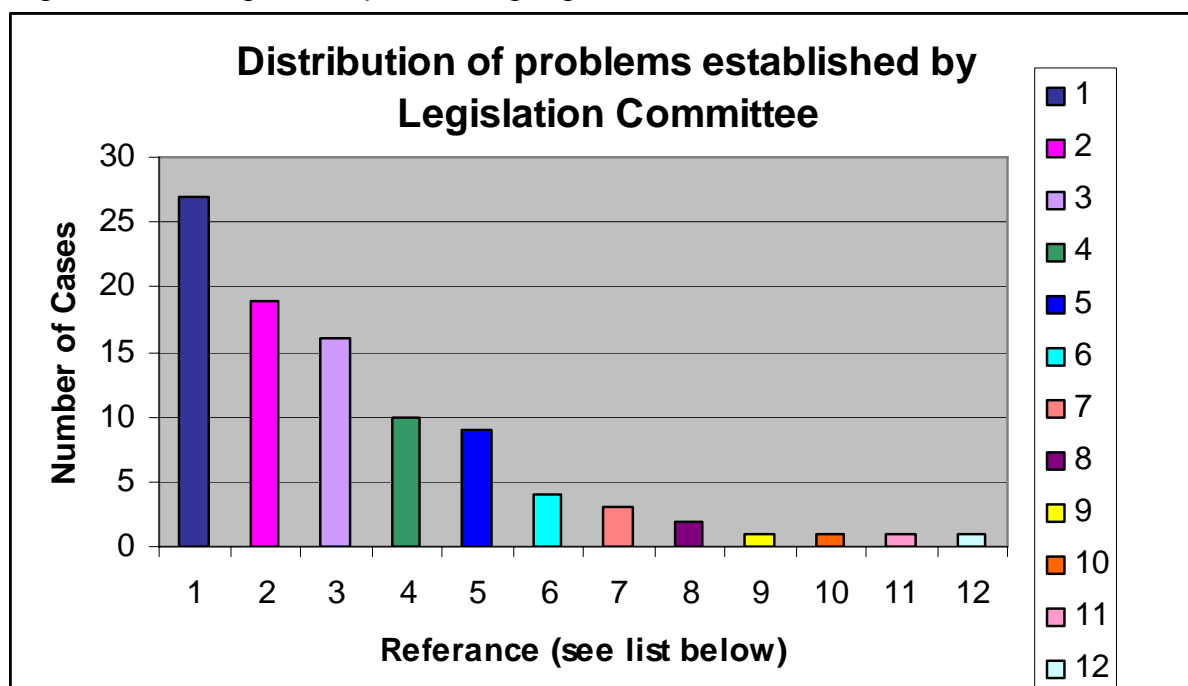
Before reporting to the Assembly the Committee is, under Standing Order 11.6, required to notify the relevant Assembly Minister of this intention and invite him or her to give evidence to the Committee.

During the reporting period (July 2005 – July 2006) the Committee considered **219** pieces of legislation.

The Committee invited the Assembly to pay special attention to legislation on **94** separate occasions. In the majority of cases those defects were capable of correction by Memorandum of Correction: **62** out of total **94** occasions.

The reasons why the Committee invited the Assembly to pay special attention to Statutory Instruments were as follows:

- the drafting appeared to be defective and there were inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts - **27** cases;
- the drafting appeared to be defective - **19** cases;
- subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh – **16** cases;
- defective drafting, subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh – **10** cases;
- there were inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts - **9** cases;
- defective drafting, inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **4**;
- defective drafting, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **3** cases;
- subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **2** cases;
- doubt whether the subordinate legislation is within the Assembly’s powers, defective drafting, inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **1** case;
- inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **1** case;
- need for further clarification, subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh – **1** case;
- defective drafting, legislation appears to have retrospective effect, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language – **1** case.



- 1** - the drafting appeared to be defective and there were inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts;
- 2** - the drafting appeared to be defective;
- 3** - subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh;
- 4** - defective drafting, subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh;

- 5 - there were inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts;
- 6 - defective drafting, inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 7 - defective drafting, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 8 - subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 9 - doubt whether the subordinate legislation is within the Assembly's powers, defective drafting, inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 10 - inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 11 - need for further clarification, subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh;
- 12 - defective drafting, legislation appears to have retrospective effect, subordinate legislation uses gender specific language.

OBSERVATIONS

Besides reporting formally under Standing Order 11.7, the Committee's reports to the Assembly have included observations on minor defects.

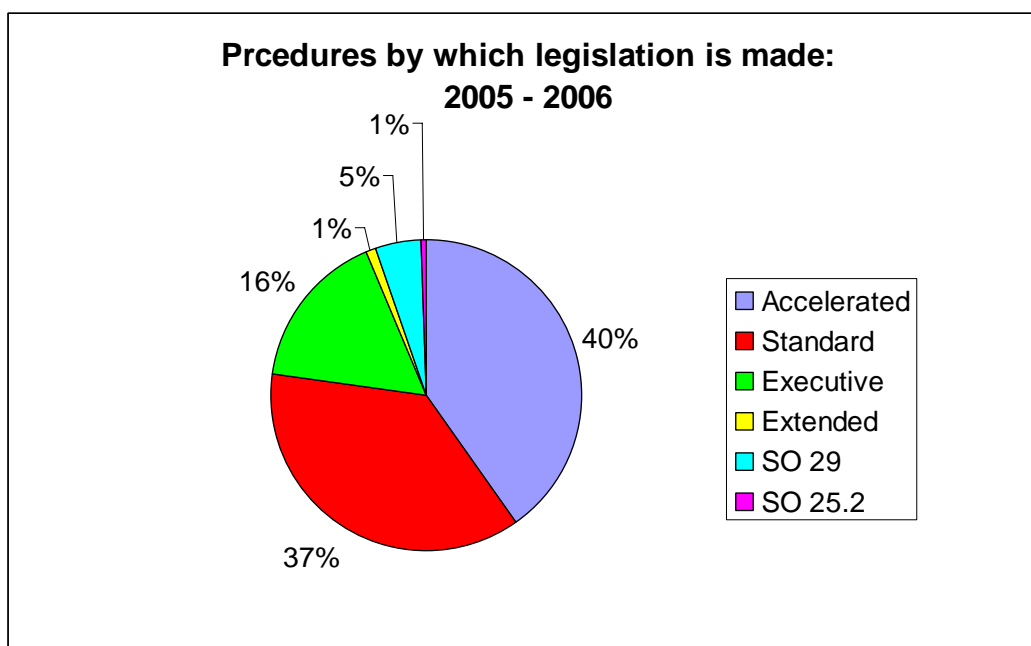
The Committee pointed out cases where drafting was defective on **76** occasions and made suggestions on the need for greater clarity on **18** occasions. Typographical errors were found in **12** cases. **8** cases contained grammatical errors. Minor inconsistencies between the English and the Welsh texts were established in **5** cases.

Out of a total of **219** Statutory Instruments considered during the period from July 2005 to July 2006, the Committee did not need to make any comments in respect of **123** Orders. The Committee invited the Assembly to pay special attention to legislation on **94** separate occasions. Of these, **68** final versions took into account Committee suggestions fully; **10** final versions incorporated some of the suggestions; **18** final versions did not incorporate the suggestions. It should be noted that relatively high percentage of printed versions that did not incorporate the Committee's suggestions in respect of the points raised under SO11.7 (i.e., 18 out of 94 final versions) was largely observed in Statutory Instruments that followed the Executive procedure (these Instruments are issued before they are seen by the Committee).

In many instances the legal advisers to the Committee had been asked to comment on early drafts of legislation. This resulted in a considerable number of drafting and other points being corrected prior to formal submission of the legislation to the Committee.

PROCEDURES BY WHICH LEGISLATION IS MADE: 2005-2006

The National Assembly processes legislation in five different ways: by Standard Procedure, Executive Procedure, Accelerated Procedure, S.O.29 and S.O.25 Part II. Out of total **219** Orders considered by the Committee during the period from July 2004 to July 2005, **126** cases (58%) followed the Standard Procedure; **29** cases (13.2%) - the Executive Procedure; **54** cases (25%) - the Accelerated Procedure, **9** cases (4.1%) – Standing Order 29 and **1** case (0.5%) – Standing Order 25 Part II. No legislation followed the Extended Procedure.



OPERATIONAL MATTERS

The Legislation Committee met almost every week when the Assembly was in session and therefore it had to work to very tight deadlines. However, the Committee operated smoothly. All draft Statutory Instruments and legal adviser reports were placed on the agenda of meetings held soon after the dates when the draft legislation was laid before the Assembly. The Committee Secretariat aimed to provide Members with all papers two working days before the meeting, in line with the Standing Order 8.22. Following each meeting the Secretariat ensured that the Committee's Reports were laid before the Assembly as soon as possible, usually the same day. The reports and minutes were placed on the Internet within two working days after the Committee meetings. All SO 11.6 letters (i.e., the letters from the Chair alerting the Minister that the Committee had invited the Assembly to pay special attention to proposed Assembly Orders) were also sent within that time scale.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

CHANGES IN STANDING ORDERS

At the meeting on 20 September 2005 the Chair informed the Members that the Committee's proposal to amend Standing Order 11 to strengthen its position in relation to the use of gender specific language and legislation not made bilingually had been approved in Plenary on 12 July 2005 and the Standing Orders had been amended accordingly. Now the Committee could officially report to the Plenary that:

- 11.7(vii) – the subordinate legislation uses gender specific language;
- 11.7(viii) - the subordinate legislation is not to be made in both English and Welsh.

LC1150 - THE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICES ACT 2004 (CONSEQUENTIAL AMENDMENTS) (WALES) ORDER 2005

The Members discussed this Order at the meeting on the 11 October 2005. There was a difference of opinions between the Legal Advisers to the Committee and the drafting lawyers. The Legal Advisers thought that the words "England or" should be removed from the word combination "or in England or Wales, fire and rescue authorities", because the Order was relevant only to Wales; this opinion was shared by the Clerk to the North Wales Fire and Rescue Authorities. The Legal Advisers stated that England had already made the corresponding legislation referring to the Fire and Rescue Authorities and that legislation contained no reference to Wales. The corresponding English and Welsh legislation would not match if the words "England or" were left intact. Also, previously there had been incidents when the problems arose from the fact that one part of the United Kingdom purported to legislate for another part; when references had been made to "the Scottish Ministers" and to "the Secretary of State for England and Wales" when the matter had been actually already transferred to the Assembly. If the words "England or" were not removed, a similar situation could potentially arise in respect of this Order in the future. Other concerns were that this might influence such issues as pay and conditions or provisions for special grants from Central Authorities and that the Committee should follow the advice given in the "Observations received on behalf of the Minister" i.e, should leave the Order as it was drafted. After a lengthy discussion it was decided to put the issue to vote. The result of the vote was 4 to 3 in favour of leaving the Order as it was originally drafted. The Chair did not vote. The Committee's report had been changed accordingly.

CHANGES IN THE COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP

The meeting on the 17 January 2006 was the last one chaired by Glyn Davies AM. Glyn Davies AM had been a Member of the Committee since November 2000 and its Chair since 2003. Throughout these years his contribution had helped to shape the Committee and make it a successful scrutinising body.

Laura Jones AM was another Member to leave the Committee at the same time, having been on the Committee since June 2003. At the meeting on the 24 January 2006 the new Chair, David Melding AM, on behalf of the Committee expressed gratitude to Glyn Davies AM and Laura Jones AM for their work and welcomed a new Member, Brynle Williams AM, to the Committee.

When addressing the Committee, David Melding AM expressed his belief that the role of the Legislation Committee - to ensure that the legislation made by the full Assembly is not defective and that any relevant requirements have been complied with – was very important. He went on to say that the remit of the Committee would entirely change post-2007 and the Committee needed to explore the possibilities for the scope/remit post-2007. The Chair proposed that the Legal Advisers prepare a paper reflecting on the scope/remit of committees in Scotland, England and Northern Ireland with responsibilities similar to those that the Legislation Committee might have post-2007. The Committee agreed.

STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS MADE ONLY IN ENGLISH

At the meeting 14 February 2006 the Committee considered, among others, the following Statutory Instruments:

LC1218 – The General Dental Services and Personal Dental Services Transitional Provisions (Wales) Order 2006

LC1219 – Functions of Local Health Boards (Dental Public Health) (Wales) Regulations 2006

LC1224 – The National Health Service (General Dental Services Contracts) (Wales) Regulations 2006

LC1225 – The National Health Service (Personal Dental Services Agreements) (Wales) Regulations 2006

Lc1226 – The National Health Service (Dental Charges) (Wales) Regulations 2006

The Members noted that there were no Welsh versions of these Statutory Instruments and were of the view that despite time constraints and complexities all legislation should be produced in bilingual format. The Committee was informed that the primary obstacle to producing Statutory Instruments bilingually is a failure by those involved in negotiations at an England and Wales level to have sufficient regard for the time needed to make bilingual legislation. The Chair wrote to the Minister to express the Members' concerns. This matter was also looked at when the Committee conducted the Review on the scrutiny of legislation following the 2007 elections to the National Assembly.

THE TECHNICAL SCRUTINY OF LEGISLATION BY THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY FROM MAY 2007

At its meeting on the 14 February 2006 the Committee discussed the Legal Advisers' paper on the scope/remit of committees in Scotland, England and Northern Ireland with responsibilities similar to those that the Legislation Committee might have post-2007. The Committee agreed to review such matters and the terms of reference of the review. The information about the Review was included on the Legislation Committee's website and a letter was sent to all AMs, inviting comments on the scrutiny of legislation following the 2007 elections to the National Assembly.

The terms of reference were:

“To consider

(a) what scrutiny by the National Assembly would be appropriate for the various types of legislation to be made by the Welsh Assembly Government and the National Assembly after the coming into force of the relevant parts of the Government of Wales Bill;

(b) what scrutiny by the National Assembly would be appropriate for proposed Westminster and European legislation relevant to Wales after that date; and

(c) what role a dedicated legislation committee might have in such scrutiny and to make recommendations.”

At its meeting on 21 March 2006 the Committee considered the scrutiny of secondary legislation in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland and held a discussion with the Chair of the Business Committee, Jenny Randerson AM.

In discussion, among other points, the following news emerged:

- the best way to produce bilingual legislation would be by co-drafting;
- the number of bilingual lawyers working both for the Government and for the Assembly would need to increase;
- to alleviate the difficulties of training and recruitment of such specialists, the links with the Universities should be established and relevant internal Civil service courses should be developed;
- all draft Statutory Instruments kept in electronic format should be backed by at least one paper master copy, as electronic documents could easily be changed and the origin of such changes would be hard to trace.

At the meeting on 28 March 2006 the Members received a presentation by and had a discussion with Mr David Lambert, and Ms Marie Navarro from Cardiff Law School, Cardiff University. Among others, the following points were made in discussion:

- if, under the new legislation, a Legislation Committee was established it could potentially have a very wide remit which could include scrutiny of any law affecting Wales, both in terms of the legality of the instruments, and their merits;
- the ideal position would be for the Assembly or its committees to scrutinise all Wales related legislation (wherever made) although in practice this would be very difficult;
- from May 2007 most general Statutory Instruments will not be scrutinised by the Assembly before being made as most will be made by the Welsh Ministers. The new procedure created by the Government of Wales Act will involve new Orders in Council and Measures made under those Orders and the Assembly will be more occupied in looking at proposed draft Orders in Council and measures;
- there are a number of possibilities as to the role of a Legislation Committee post 2007: the Committee could:
 - look at all Statutory Instruments as it does now, whether or not they had to go to Plenary;
 - look at the 10 percent of legislation which would be considered by Plenary therefore allowing the Committee to spend time looking at other matters, such as the legality, or legality and merits, of proposed Orders in Council, the legality of the Measures made by the Assembly Government;
 - consider bills and statutory instruments which are made in Westminster by the UK Government and which affect Wales.

The meeting on 4 April 2006 was attended by the National Assembly's representative in Brussels Anna Daniel, who explained how the process of scrutinising EU legislation was currently undertaken by the Assembly's Committees and why it was important for such scrutiny to take place at an early stage in the legislative process. The Committee considered whether, post-2007, the Legislation Committee might look at European legislation. The following points were highlighted:

- the Committee can look at whether recommendations made by other Committees have been addressed and/or implemented by the Assembly Government;
- in cases where a subject committee identifies an area as particularly important, the Legislation Committee can examine the powers used by the Assembly Government and what regulations it has introduced.

On 2 May 2006 the Committee held a video conference with the Subordinate Legislation Committee of the Scottish Parliament, represented by Sylvia Jackson MSP (Convener) and Stewart Maxwell MSP. It was established:-

- the Scottish Committee was conducting the inquiry into the regulatory framework in Scotland;
- there were two phases to the inquiry; at the time the inquiry was in the second phase;
- the Subordinate Legislation Committee had identified a number of problems and it was now ready to make recommendations on how to tackle those problems;
- the Sewel Convention permits Westminster to legislate for Scotland on devolved as well as reserved matters. The Scottish Parliament has developed a new procedure where the Scottish Executive provides the Parliament with a “Legislative Consent Memorandum” which gives details of a Westminster Bill which impacts on Scotland and provides information on relevant provisions which would be subject to scrutiny by the Scottish Parliament through its committees. The Subordinate Legislation Committee’s responsibility is to consider those Westminster provisions that give the Scottish Executive new powers to make subordinate legislation. This is a very new procedure and by the time of the videoconference the Subordinate Legislation Committee had scrutinised only two such Memoranda. The Committee mostly scrutinised Scottish legislation;
- although the Subordinate Legislation Committee has an input into ensuring that legislation in Bills is compliant with European Directives, the Scottish Parliament’s subject committees have a role in terms of scrutinising the policy contained in Bills and that they are EC compliant;
- the Subordinate Legislation Committee deals with Acts of the Scottish Parliament and Legislative Consent Memoranda which accompany Bills (in addition to Scottish Statutory Instruments);
- the Subordinate Legislation Committee concentrates on the delegated powers in Bills and their technical merits; what powers were given to the Ministers - how clear the drafting of the Statutory Instruments is – how easy it is to understand; policy matters are scrutinised by subject committees.

It was summed up that the Subordinate Legislation Committee had much work to do during the progress of Bills through the Scottish Parliament, focusing on the delegated provisions in Bills and subsequent amendments which involve delegated provisions. The Subordinate Legislation Committee relies on its legal advisers to provide it with advice on Bills, and also on the information included in the Executive’s Explanatory Memoranda which accompany all legislation. If the Committee feels that the Executive did not provide sufficient information to help its consideration, writes to the relevant Executive Departments asking for more information. If the amendments made at the 3rd stage of the legislative process were technically incorrect, the Chamber itself would be the final arbiter, however the Subordinate Legislation Committee would make its concerns known to the Parliament either by way of amendments or verbally in debate. The video conference (the first one to be held in the Senedd) proved to be a most useful and relevant exercise.

At the meeting on 9 May 2006 the Members reviewed of all the evidence received by the Committee in the course of the Inquiry. At the meeting on 23 May 2006 the draft report was approved. The principal recommendation made by the Review was that a Legislation Committee be established and be given the following responsibilities-

- (i) the continuation of its current role of the technical scrutiny of subordinate legislation, with the freedom to consider the merits of occasional items of legislation. It would not question the policy objective, but consider whether the legislation was the most effective way of achieving that objective.
 - (ii) to review and report on all provisions in Assembly Measures that grant powers to make subordinate legislation to Welsh Ministers;
 - (iii) to review and report on provisions in Bills not being considered by another Assembly committee, that grant powers to make subordinate legislation to Welsh Ministers;
 - (iv) to review and report on the implications for Welsh legislation of draft orders under the Legislative and Regulatory Reform Bill not being considered by another Assembly committee;
 - (v) to review the use of commencement powers in Assembly Measures and Acts of Parliament of particular application to Wales;
 - (vi) to consider and advise the Assembly on any other matter of a legislative nature of general application, including in particular the operation of bilingual legislation;
- The Committee should also be given the power to review and report on the implications of any draft European legislation not being considered by another Assembly committee.

The Report was published both on the Internet and in hard copy. Copies were sent to the Presiding Officer, First Minister, all presenters, AMs and the newly formed Committee on Standing Orders. Using the materials of the Review, the Chair gave evidence to the Committee on Standing Orders on Monday, 17 July. The full text of the Review can be found on the Legislation Committee's website.

A LETTER FROM THE CHAIR OF THE UNCRC (UN CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD) MONITORING GROUP IN WALES

At the meeting on 13 June 2006 the Members discussed a letter from the Chair of the UNCRC Monitoring group in Wales, who asked the Committee to consider whether it could adopt a policy routine "UNCRC proofing" of relevant Assembly legislation. The Committee Chair wrote to the Business Committee and the Committee on Standing Orders to make them aware of the issue.

LC1234 – THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (WALES) ORDER 2006 LC1235 – THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (CONTROL OF VACCINATION) (WALES) REGULATIONS 2006

At the meeting on 14 March 2006 the Members considered LC1234 – The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Wales) Order 2006 and LC1235 – The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Vaccination) (Wales) Regulations 2006. Both Statutory Instruments followed the Executive procedure. In relation to LC1234 it was noted that this Order had not been made bilingually. LC1235 contained errors that would normally be amended by a Memorandum of Corrections but as the Regulations had already been made these errors would need to be corrected through amending legislation. The Chair wrote about these two matters to the Minister concerned seeking his observations under Standing Order 11.6 before finalising the draft reports.

At the meeting on 2 May 2006 the Members considered the Minister's response and agreed that the reports regarding these Statutory Instruments should be revised to include reference to the Minister's comments.

At the meeting on 9 May 2006 the Members' attention was drawn to the explanation given by the Minister in respect of the Committee's report on LC1234 - The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Wales) Order 2006 (3rd reporting point under 11.7), which included the fact that some of the problems were caused by the use of the services of external translators, as the in-house translators of the Directorate of Legal Services did not have enough time to do the necessary work due to the shortage of resources. Also, the Members suggested that this Order should be re-made bilingually, as from the Minister's reply it was evident that there was a Welsh text which was almost ready. In respect of LC1235 - The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Vaccination) (Wales) Regulations 2006 it was noted that it was absolutely crucial to put right the point on the discrepancy between the English and Welsh texts highlighted in the third paragraph of the report under the Standing Order 11.7 ("In the definition of "minced meat" in regulation 2, the English text provides that it must contain "less than 1% salt". The Welsh text refers to "llai nag 1% o fraster" [*fat*]. [Standing Order 11.7(vi)]). The Chair wrote to the Minister for Environment, Planning and Countryside Carwyn Jones AM to draw his attention to these matters.

At the meeting on 20 June 2006 the Members considered the Minister's response. The Minister explained the absence of the Welsh text of LC1324 - The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Wales) Order 2006. It was made in English only because the Welsh text had become unusable due to computer problems. It was noted that the Minister had referred in his reply to the availability of limited resources. Later on, the Chair mentioned the shortage of resources in his presentation to the Committee on Standing Orders.

The Committee's reports on these two Statutory Instruments were laid with the Table Office on 9 May 2006.

LC1286 – THE NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE (TRAVELLING EXPENSES AND REMISSION OF CHARGES) (AMENDMENT) (WALES) REGULATIONS 2006

At the meeting on 16 May 2006 the Members discussed LC1286 – The National Health Service (Travelling Expenses and Remission of Charges) (Amendment) (Wales) Regulations 2006. It was noted that back in 2001, the Legislation Committee recommended that as the text of the 1988 Regulations became extremely complicated, consideration should be given to the making of a consolidated re-enactment of the 1988 Regulations for Wales. At the time the Committee was considering LC341 - The National Health Service (Travelling Expenses and Remission of Charges) (Amendment) (No. 2) (Wales) Regulations 2001. Those observations were repeated in the Committee's report on LC686 - The National Health Service (Travelling Expenses and Remission of Charges) (Amendment) (Wales) Regulations 2003. As the position still remained unchanged, those observations were repeated yet again in the Committee's report on LC1286. The Chair wrote to the Minister for Health and Social Services Dr Brian Gibbons AM to draw his attention to the Committee's repeated observations. The Minister accepted that the Regulations lacked clarity and promised that they will be re-made bilingually in April 2007.

LETTER FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BUSINESS COMMITTEE: IMPLICATIONS OF THE LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY REFORM BILL - CONSENT TO ORDERS WHICH AFFECT THE MINISTERS' FUNCTIONS AND CONSULTATION ON PROPOSALS RELATING TO THESE FUNCTIONS

At the meeting on 11 July 2007 the Chair stated that the Legislation Committee had already considered the implications of the Legislative and Regulatory Reform Bill and was aware that following the Government of Wales Bill it was intended that Welsh Ministers (and not the National Assembly) would be required to consent to Orders which affect their functions (Clause 12 (formerly 9) of the LRR Bill) and would be consulted on proposals relating to their functions (now in Clause 14(1)(c)). He went on to say that the Business Committee believed that post-2007 these functions should stay with the National Assembly and not transfer to the Welsh Ministers. He asked the Legislation Committee its opinion.

In discussion, the following points were raised:

- currently the National Assembly has to consent occasionally to secondary legislation made by the Secretary of State and that does not generate much work;
- democracy required that the powers should be with the National Assembly rather than with Ministers;
- the power to consent would lie with the National Assembly, while the power to negotiate would be with the Ministers and in terms of time consenting would take hours rather than weeks.
- there should be a mechanism to transfer this function to the Welsh Ministers if the powers were left with the National Assembly and the task proved to be too onerous.

It was decided that the National Assembly functions to consent and be consulted should remain with the Assembly rather than be transferred to Ministers. The Chair wrote to the Chair of the Business Committee to inform her of the opinion of the Legislation Committee.
